


# YEAR 10 BIOLOGISTS

Year 10 Biology students at Derby Grammar School have been putting theory into practice by conducting one of the key practical experiments in their GCSE curriculum—extracting DNA from banana cells.

This hands-on experiment allows pupils to gain a deeper understanding of DNA structure and function, reinforcing key biological concepts while encouraging them to think critically about the scientific method. By following a precise series of steps, students were able to isolate visible strands of DNA, helping to bring textbook learning to life in a tangible and engaging way.

Interestingly, HRH Prince William recently undertook the same experiment alongside scientist Manny in a viral video, where they successfully extracted DNA from a strawberry. The Prince even humorously referred to himself as Manny's "beautiful assistant" during the demonstration.

Our dedication to Latin was on full display at the 2024 EMACT Latin Reading Competition, where our students performed exceptionally well against some of the country's leading classics schools.

The competition, which has been running for nearly 30 years, brings together young classicists to showcase their mastery of Latin pronunciation, rhythm, and interpretation. This year's event, hosted by Loughborough High School, welcomed guest teams from Oakham, Pocklington, and King Edward's Birmingham, highlighting the enduring appeal of Latin despite its decline in mainstream education.

Derby Grammar School's students delivered outstanding performances across multiple categories:

 Intermediate Competition - Alex Kirke & Aryan Mehta impressed judges with their expertly recited passage from Virgil's Aeneid 1, which they had scanned and practised independently.

- Novice Section Charlie Savva, George West, Joan Obayomi & Sofia Cornwell Captivated Playlet, securing 2nd place and earning certificates and prizes.

# **SCIENCE ROUND-UP**

# Year 10 Biologists Gain First-Hand Insight into the Eye

As part of their GCSE Biology studies, Year 10 students at Derby Grammar School recently took part in a hands-on dissection of sheep's eyes, providing them with a unique opportunity to explore the structure and function of the eye in detail.

This practical activity, which forms part of the Cells and Control topic, allowed students to examine key features of the nervous system and sensory organs, reinforcing their understanding of how the eye processes visual information. By carefully dissecting and identifying structures such as the cornea, lens, retina, and optic nerve, pupils were able to see first-hand how each part contributes to vision.

Practical dissections such as this are an essential element of science education, helping students to develop their observational, analytical, and problem-solving skills while bringing textbook theory to life. Engaging in hands-on learning not only enhances scientific curiosity but also prepares students for future study in biology, medicine, and related fields.

By fostering a deeper understanding of complex biological processes, Derby Grammar School continues to provide an engaging and rigorous science curriculum that encourages exploration and discovery.



# **A LEVEL PRACTICAL**

#### Year 13 Investigate Photosynthesis with Chromatography

Year 13 Biology students at Derby Grammar School recently conducted an advanced scientific investigation using thin-layer chromatography (TLC) to analyse the photosynthetic pigments in spinach leaves.

This practical experiment, a key component of their A-Level studies on photosynthesis, provided valuable insights into the biochemical processes that drive plant life.

Chromatography is a highly effective technique for separating mixtures, and in this case, students used it to isolate and identify different pigments involved in photosynthesis. By applying an extract from spinach leaves onto a TLC plate and allowing a solvent to carry the pigments upwards, they were able to observe distinct bands representing chlorophyll a, chlorophyll b, carotenoids, and xanthophylls —each playing a crucial role in light absorption and energy conversion in plants.

This hands-on investigation reinforced students' understanding of how plants capture and utilise light energy, while also developing their practical skills in laboratory techniques, data analysis, and scientific reasoning essential skills for future studies in biological and environmental sciences.
